



Its object was defined as "the general advancement of all the various branches of glass technology by the association of persons interested in glass and glassware: the reading and discussion of papers; the publication of scientific information on glass technology; the formation of a library and museum."

Aspects of Glass


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It is hard to imagine modern life without the fascinating material that is glass. We have come a long way in our use and understanding of this material, yet significant challenges and opportunities remain.
